ORDERS BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR OF BENGAL.

No. 20293 A.—*The 23rd October 1926.*—His Excellency the Governor of Bengal has been pleased to appoint Lieutenant J. C. A. Battye, 11th Pack Battery, Royal Artillery, as an Aide-de-Camp on his personal staff from the 9th October 1926, *vice* Lieutenant J. W. W. Cripps, resigned.

No. 20308 A.—*The 25th October 1926.*—In pursuance of the provisions of sub-rule (2) of rule 32 of the Bengal Electoral Rules, His Excellency the Governor has appointed the Chief Secretary to the Government of Bengal to be the officer to whom Election Petitions under the said rules may be delivered.

NOTIFICATION.

No. 11353P.—The 25th October 1926.—Notification No. 735P.-D., dated the 8th June 1926, published at page 830, Part I of the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 17th June 1926, which declared the following ancient monuments in mauzas Pareshnath and Sarengarh, in thana Ranibandh in Bankura district, to be protected monuments, is hereby confirmed under section 3 (3) of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 (VII of 1904):—

In mauza Pareshnath—

- (1) A temple site now represented only by a mound and statue of Surja.

In mauza Sarengarh—

- (2) A temple site now represented only by a mound.
- (3) A temple site now represented only by a mound with statues of Ganesh and Nandi on it.
- (4) An image of Durga slaying Mohisasura under a tree.
- (5) A temple site now represented only by a mound with an image of Nandi on it.
