NOTIFICATIONS.

✓ No. 4917.—*The 14th November 1913.*—General Department Notifications Nos. 3241, 3242 and 3243, dated the 8th July 1913, published at pages 1084-85, Part I, of the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 9th July 1913, are hereby cancelled.

No 4844.—*The 12th November 1913.*—In exercise of the power conferred by sub-section (1) of section 3 of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 (VII of 1904), the Governor in Council is pleased to declare the tomb and the mosque of Murshid Kuli Khan at Katra, situated in the village of Sabji Katra, in the Lalbagh subdivision of the district of Murshidabad, and bounded as follows, to be a protected mosque within the meaning of the said Act:—

Murshidabad.

North and East—Nawab Bahadur of Murshidabad's land,

South—Road in the Katra market,

West—Government estate Sabji Katra.

2. Any objections to the issue of this notification which are received by the undersigned within one month from the date on which a copy of the notification is fixed up in a conspicuous place on or near the said monument will be taken into consideration.

✓ RESOLUTION—By the Government of India, Department of Education.

THE Government of India have had under their consideration the recommendation of the Conference of Orientalists held at Simla in July 1911 that opportunity should be afforded to Indian students to accompany Conservators in order to learn the principles and practice of architecture. They have decided in communication with those local Governments, who have consulting architects, to award three scholarships of the value of Rs. 100 a month to Indians, in order to facilitate this training. As there are greater facilities for architectural education, and for a combination of a thorough course of theoretical instruction with practical training, in Bombay than elsewhere in India, they have decided that these scholars should be trained in the office of the Consulting Architect to the Government of Bombay.

2. The conditions of the three architectural scholarships will be as follows:—

- (a) the scholarships which are open to all natives of India will be of the value of Rs. 100 a month each, the cost of which will be defrayed from Imperial revenues;

- (b) the scholarships will be granted for architectural training at the office of the Consulting Architect to the Government of Bombay where the scholars will also attend the architectural classes at the Sir J. J. School of Art. They will be tenable for a period of three years in the first instance, but may be extended to a fourth year on the condition that the scholarships for that year will be given only to those scholars who pass a certain standard to be prescribed hereafter in an examination at the end of the third year's training;
- (c) at the close of their training those scholars who appear to possess the necessary aptitude will, so far as possible, be taken into the Archaeological Department in order to give them special practical instruction for one or two years on a suitable salary.
3. The following procedure will be observed in the selection of candidates for the scholarships:—
- (a) each local Government will be asked to nominate as soon as possible a candidate who has taken the B.A. or other equivalent degree in an Indian University. These qualifications will only be dispensed with in exceptional cases. The candidate must produce a medical certificate of physical fitness to undergo the proposed courses of study at Bombay;
- (b) the Government of India will select three scholars from among the candidates nominated by the local Governments.

4. The candidates to whom the scholarships are awarded will proceed to Bombay and report themselves to the Consulting Architect to the Government of Bombay not later than a certain date to be fixed hereafter. The scholarships will be payable from the dates of the report of their arrival in Bombay.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to all local Governments and Administrations for information and necessary action at an early date.

Ordered, also, that a copy be forwarded to the Finance

Director-General of Archaeology in India Department for information and that the resolution be published in the supplement to the *Gazette of India*.

No. 4864.—*The 13th November 1913.*—In exercise of the power conferred by sub-section (1) of section 3 of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 (VII of 1904), the Governor in Council is pleased to declare the group of four ancient temples at Begunia, police-station Barakar, in the Asansol subdivision of the Burdwan district, and bounded as follows, to be protected monuments within the meaning of the said Act:—

Boundaries.

North and West.—The Shibattar land of Maharaja Monindra Chandra Nandy of Kassimbazar,

South and East.—The Shibattar land of Maharaja Monindra Chandra Nandy of Kassimbazar (including a tank) and the *mal* land of Bijoy Krishna Mukharji of Begunia held under the same Maharaja.

Area.—Roughly speaking 2 bighas.
