APPOINTMENTS AND TRANSFERS.

GENERAL.—No. 3981A.—The 22nd July 1913.—Babu Hari Bhushan De, Deputy Magistrate and Deputy Collector, Lalbagh, Murshidabad, is transferred to the head-quarters station of the Nadia district.

SURVEY DEPARTMENT.**NOTICE.**

GOVERNMENT has sanctioned, as an experimental measure, the establishment of a School of Land Surveying from October next, some four miles from Comilla, which will take the place of the First-year's Land Surveying Course at the Dacca School of Engineering. Full particulars may be obtained from the undersigned.

The names of students already registered for the next First-year's Course at the Dacca School will be transferred to the Entry Rolls of the new School.

The object of the school is to turn out practical Land Surveyors suitable for zamindari and similar work in Bengal. Details of the training that will be given will be forwarded to any employers who care to ask for them, and, so far as is practicable, special training will be arranged for Surveyors already in their employ.

No. 3536.—The 19th July 1913.—The services of Shams-ul-Ulama Abu Nasr Muhammad Waheed, Superintendent, Dacca Madrassa, are placed temporarily at the disposal of the Government of Bihar and Orissa.

No. 3601.—The 22nd July 1913.—Mr. W. B. Finnigan (class II of the Subordinate Educational Service), is appointed to be Personal Assistant to the Director of Public Instruction, Bengal, with effect from the 1st July 1913, *vice* Rai Sahib Haradhan Basu, retired.

Extract (paragraphs 1 and 2) from the proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department (Public), under date Calcutta, the 8th December 1899.

RESOLUTION.

THE Secretary of State for India has brought to the notice of the Government of India that it not infrequently happens that natives of India, students or others, who have proceeded to England, desire to obtain passports

them to travel to foreign countries in which the possession of a passport is necessary or desirable, and that difficulty often arises from want of evidence to show that the applicant is a British subject, and therefore entitled to a passport. Appeals for assistance are also frequently addressed to His Lordship by destitute Indians who desire to return to their country and by students who, owing to embarrassed circumstances, are unable to complete their course of education.

2. In order to enable the Secretary of State to deal with such cases satisfactorily, the Governor-General in Council has decided that it is necessary to press upon Indian students and others visiting England the desirability of providing themselves, before their departure from India, with an authoritative certificate of identity, in the form appended to this Resolution, signed by the head of the district (in a Presidency town, the Commissioner of Police) in the case of residents of British India and by the Political Officer in that of residents of Native States. For a student the certificate should be signed by the head of his last school or college and countersigned by the District Officer (in a Presidency Town, the Commissioner of Police) or Political Officer, as the case may be.

No. 3525.—The 19th July 1913.—In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (1) of section 3 of the Ancient Monuments Protection Act, 1904 (Act VII of 1904), the Governor in Council is pleased to declare the mosque and tombs situated in the village Satgaon within the jurisdiction of police-station Magra, in the district of Hooghly, and bounded as follows, to be a protected monument within the meaning of the said Act :—

North and South—By Government land khas mahals and Mir Sahib's lands.

East—By Grand Trunk Road.

West—By Saraswati river.

Any objections to issue of this notification which are received by the undersigned within one month from the date on which a copy of the notification is published in a conspicuous place on or near the aforesaid mosque and tombs will be taken into consideration.
