Copy of a letter No. 2773F., dated the 26th April 1916, to the Accountant-General, Bengal.

IN continuation of Government Order No. 1640F., dated the 16th March 1916, I am directed to convey the sanction of Government to the grant of grain compensation allowance of Re. 1 a month to all whole-time servants under this Government on the Civil establishment, drawing Rs. 12 or less per month, who were employed in the districts of Bengal, except Jalpaiguri and the Chittagong Hill Tracts, in which cheapest common rice was dearer than 10 seers per rupee during the month of March 1916. These orders will have effect for the month of March 1916.

No. 4T.—S.R.—The 29th April 1916.—The following is substituted for the heading of column 6 of Form I appended to the Rules for the recruitment of Superintendents and Inspectors of Excise and Salt, as published under Notification No. 501S.R., dated the 15th March 1915:—

“*Column 6*—Other information regarding the candidate (physique, moral character, present occupation, etc.) including a declaration whether or not he has at any time been pronounced unfit for Government employment by the Medical Board at the India Office, or any other duly constituted medical authority.”
