NOTIFICATIONS.

No. 723 P.D.—The 8th June 1926.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 3, sub-section (1) of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 (VII of 1904), the Government of Bengal are pleased to declare the temple of Radha Damodar Jew in mauza Ghatgoria in thana Barjora, district Bankura, to be a protected monument within the meaning of that Act.

2. Any objections to the issue of this notification which are received by the undersigned within one month from the date on which a copy of the notification is fixed up in a conspicuous place on or near the said monument, will be taken into consideration.

No. 730 P.D.—The 8th June 1926.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 3, sub-section (1) of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 (VII of 1904), the Government of Bengal are pleased to declare the temple of Ratneswar in mauza Jagannathpur in thana Barjora in Bankura district, to be a protected monument within the meaning of the said Act.

2. Any objection to the issue of the notification which is received by the undersigned within one month from the date on which a copy of the notification is posted in a conspicuous place on or near the said monument, will be taken into consideration.

No. 735 P.D.—The 8th June 1926.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 3, sub-section (1) of the Ancient Monuments Preservation Act, 1904 (VII of 1904), the Government of Bengal are pleased to declare the following ancient monuments in mauzas Pareshnath and Sarengarh, in thana Ranibandh in Bankura district, to be protected monuments within the meaning of the said Act:—

In mauza Pareshnath—

- (1) A temple site now represented only by a mound and statue of Surja.

In mauza Sarengarh—

- (2) A temple site now represented only by a mound ;
 (3) A temple site now represented only by a mound with statues of Ganesh and Nandi on it ;
 (4) An image of Durga slaying Mohisasura under a tree ; and
 (5) A temple site now represented only by a mound with an image of Nandi on it.

2. Any objection to the issue of the notification which is received by the undersigned, within one month from the date on which a copy of the notification is fixed up in a conspicuous place on or near the said monuments, will be taken into consideration.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Orders by the Commissioner of Police.

IN exercise of the power conferred by clause (c) of section 62 (1) of the Calcutta Police Act, IV of 1866, the Commissioner of Police, Calcutta, with the previous sanction of the Governor in Council, hereby makes the following amendment in the rules laid down for the regulation of traffic, etc., in the streets and public places of Calcutta and its suburbs as published on page 435 in Part I of the *Calcutta Gazette* of 8th March 1922, under notification, dated the 2nd March 1922:—

Amendment.

In schedule B referred to in rule 4 in Part I (c) relating to standing vehicles substitute the following entry:—

1 Streets.	2 Manner in which vehicles are allowed to stand.
Bertram Street	... In one line on the west side.
For the existing entry:— Bertram Street	... In two single lines, one on each side.
