No. 3733Fl.—The 14th October 1925.—The following draft of amendments which, in exercise of the power conferred by section 11 of the Indian Motor Vehicles Act, 1914 (VIII of 1914), read with section 21 of the General Clauses Act, 1897 (X of 1897), the Governor in Council proposes to make in the rules regulating the use of motor vehicles in the Bengal Presidency other than in Calcutta (including its suburbs and the municipality of Howrah), published with notification No. 12667P., dated the 3rd October 1917, in the *Calcutta Gazette* of the same date, is published for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby.

II. The draft will be taken into consideration on or after the 1st December 1925, and any objection or suggestion received by the undersigned with regard thereto before that date will be duly considered :—

Amendments.

I. At the end of rule 49 (i) (1), in Part V, I, add the following, namely :—
“except those mentioned in sub-rule (iii).”

II. After sub-rule (ii) of rule 49 in Part V, I, of the said rules insert the following, namely :—

“(iii) Motor cars, not exceeding 10 tons in weight, when loaded, may be driven on the following roads in the Terai of the district, namely :—

(1) Siliguri-Naxalbari road.

(2) Tirihana-Bagdogra road.”
